On 9 of May 2022 the Conference on the Future of Europe came to a close with a joint declaration by the presiding EU institutions which have endorsed the conclusions emerging from 'the unprecedented democratic brainstorming' between the EU citizens and their national and supranational institutions. The EU now finds itself in an epilogue phase that should translate the hence gathered ideas in the institutional practices, not excluding the Treaty change.

However, despite the somewhat rosy and ideal picture painted in the aftermath of the conference by the supranational stakeholders about the state of the Union, the latter is not infrequently subject to strong political as well as legal conflicts, revealing disparate visions about the future of the EU, running on the axes both from the North to the South as well as from the West to the East. Furthermore, on top of these internal disputes, externally the Russian aggression on Ukraine has additionally provoked one of the greatest humanitarian, geo-strategic and security crisis on the European soil after the WWII.

The countries of Central and Eastern Europe, which have long been known as the new Member States, have not escaped these EU crises unaffected. To the contrary, if already two decades ago they were somehow paternalistically reproached by their Western counterparts for having missed the opportunity to stay silent, today the CEE Member States are producing not just more than enough noise in the EU, several of them have been seen as destroying the very constitutional fabric of EU integration: its fundamental values.

It is against this backdrop, that the Jean Monnet Chair at the New University, Ljubljana, and the ICON-S CEE Chapter organize a one-day conference within the framework of the project on the Integral Theory of the Future of Europe funded by the Slovenian Research Agency. The conference is going to examine the questions of the future of Europe by taking a perspective both on as well from the Central and Eastern Europe. In particular, four dimensions of the *problematique* will be addressed:

- 1. How and why is the East different from the West?
- 2. Constitutional Challenges for the Future of Europe
- 3. Economic, Social and Humanitarian Challenges for the Future of Europe
- 4. Political and Geo-strategic Challenges for the Future of Europe
